Our Junior Golf Program introduces all kids to the great game of golf through FREE introduction lessons, free junior golf days, and also days throughout the season of "Take a Kid to the Course for FREE". We continue to have a very successful program with us teaching over 140 kids in lessons over 2 weekends in May. The Junior Golf Days we would average between 40 - 90 kids each week starting the first Thursday in May and ending the third Thursday in June. The golfing days we have TWO mini courses set up for the beginner junior golfers to play, and the back nine for the older more advanced juniors to play. We offer the one mini course with the "Big Cups" for holes on the greens for a much easier putting experience, and the other mini course is the same 5 hole setup with regular cups.

The focus of our program is to teach golf, but we also teach life skills like Core Values with honesty, integrity, sportsmanship, respect, confidence, responsibility, perseverance, courtesy, and judgement.

Studies have shown the kids taking part in golf programs are more likely to have higher confidence in their ability to do well academically, as they felt more confident in their social skills with peers, and credit the program for their ability to appreciate diversity. Our program aims to get young people ready for life's challenges by improving their interpersonal skills, managing emotions, goal setting, and resilience.

Kids returning to the program the following year have had positive experience, improved their golf skills, and have had lots of fun. With the younger kids we offer a SNAG GOLF SYSTEM that is an oversize golf club, a tennis ball sized golf ball, and larger targets to make the game easier to start with. We have kids starting at the age of 5 years old and continue with the program until they graduate from high school. The lesson program we offer each season changes from year to year to make it new and exciting for all the kids especially the ones that participated in previous years. By changing the curriculum each year keeps the kids entertained and challenged through different teaching techniques, drills, and games. The lesson age groups are from 5 years old to 8 years old, 9 to 12, and 13 years and older. We find having the kids in these age groups we are able to accomplish more and having the kids enjoying the lessons even more. The biggest highlight we purchase large pool inflatable animals like flamingos, ducks, and birds that are 7 feet tall and the kids love hitting balls at these types of targets. With these targets, drills, and games we have the

ability to keep the kids engaged in the lessons for the total 45 minutes to an hour. Also through our lessons we will talk about rules of golf, etiquette of the game, and respect of other golfers.

The Junior Golf Days are held on Thursdays in the month of May and June with the kids golfing after school for free. We provide all the necessary equipment again for all the kids to take part in the junior golf days. The environment is supervised by one of our PGA Professionals and other pro shop staff, and we ask that a parent walks with each group while playing the mini course. Each junior golfer receives a T-shirt with a team name on the tee shirt as their uniform to wear when they come out to play. So upon arrival to play on Thursdays they register with the pro shop staff, pick up their own scorecard, equipment is provided from clubs, balls, and tees. We typically have a chipping competition on our Golf Dart Board for points, and then depending on their age and skill level we determine what mini course to play. Points are awarded also for their teams for participation, team name, hole by hole score, completing and adding their scores correctly, signed scorecards, and returning the scorecards after completion of their rounds. We have a weekly updated team leaderboard for all the kids to see each week, and at the end of the season we host our own Tour Championship for all the kids. At the end of the Tour Championship all kids are offered a hot dog, hamburger, and a juice. We have some prizes for the season, and to complete our year.

The North Battleford Golf & C.C. is very proud of our Junior Golf Program, and will continue to improve each season to always be a leader in the industry for kids to participate in this great game of a lifetime. We are always looking to purchase new equipment or training tools for the kids to make it easier for all to play and enjoy this great game.

5 Proposed Activity / Program / Event

Canada's National Call to action reports of Truth and Reconciliation is being addressed through this project to commemorate the history and legacy of residential schools through its land- based learning community garden project, specialty garden boxes and beds with guidance from Elders and Cultural Advisors. This inclusive project will ensure that the shared history in our community and country will not be forgotten. This project also seeks to improve mental health wellness by offering a closer connect to soil and sun through being physically activity by promoting inclusion and supporting healthy ageing. Gardening increases physical activity, awareness of natural surroundings, cognitive stimulation, food producing scent and flowers nourish our senses.

According to agriculture Canada and the emergency food security report one way to combat food security in communities is through community gardens. The project increases biodiversity by reducing run off from rain, recycles local organic material and reduces fossil fuel use by lessening distance from land to table.

Battlefords Family Health Centre has actively sought ways to address the Calls to Action our country

in facing. The Healthy Living Land Based Learning Community Garden Project is designed to increase the amount of nutritious food available to all people, engage in active living while incorporating language, traditional /cultural knowledge, healthy eating, healthy ageing, intergenerational interactions, social participation / inclusion and community supports. In 2007, the community allotment garden began with 13 plots and with a steady growth over the past 14 seasons has grown to over 65 plots between the North Battleford and Battleford garden sites located in Treaty 6 Territory. In 2022, the project will embark in a new partnership within North Battleford which will expand the project with an additional 12 plots. Allotment gardens have many benefits, for both the gardener and the community, and as a result, the steady grow in BFHC community garden project is not surprising.

Project Description and Benefits:

The benefits include fresh food – many studies have shown the shorter distance between harvest and table, the better the food is for you, cultural and spiritual practices, financial gains, socialization, volunteerism, improved mental health and education. Land reclamation The BFHC garden project takes place on lots that have been abandoned or are ignored. Without development the lots attract garbage and crime. These lots have been turned into productive and safe areas for garden participants, community members and tourists staying in the Battlefords. Community gardens promote friendships and inter-generational experiences to support the transfer of knowledge between Elders, children, seniors and youth. The gardens also helped to inspire a greater sense of community belonging, pride and inclusion by broadening the base of programming related to healthy eating and active living, and to increase ownership and capacity through the weekly knowledge sharing and hands on learning.

BATTLEFORDS COMMUNITY PLAYERS BACKGROUND INFORMATION 1933 – 2022

In 1933 – Charles Tubb represented Battlefords Little Theatre Club on the board of the newly formed Dominion Drama Festival – Saskatchewan Region.

1933 to 1952 - The Battlefords Little Theatre Club present 11 public theatre performances.

1953 – Under the new name Battlefords Community Player did their first production "Murder at Midnight" and continues through to today.

1959- BCP hosted the Dominion Drama Festival – Saskatchewan Region in Sharp Auditorium in North Battleford for the first time.

1977 – Battlefords Community Players presented the first dinner theatre production in the province at the Old Heidelberg in the Frontier Mall.

1977- Battlefords Community Players participated in Chautaugua in the town of Battleford.

1979 – BCP hosted the 46th Annual DDF – Saskatchewan Region Provincial Festival again. We have since hosted the provincial festival in 1985, 1995, 2002, 2008, 2013, 2017 bringing theatre groups from across the province to perform and visit our community.

1999 – 2012 – Battlefords Community Players organized and presented On The Rivers Edge which offered the opportunity for the performances of newly written one act plays from all across the country

2011 - Battlefords Community Players purchased our own building for storage and rehearsal space.

2012- 2017 – We did fundraiser in order to improve the facility and build more storage and a workshop. Many local donations were received and with the partnership of Business for The Arts and Battlefords Agency Tribal Chiefs (BATC CDC) we were very successful in bringing a dream to a reality.

2017 - Our facility became our own little theatre.

2019 to 2022 – Battlefords Community Players struggled with COVID just like everyone else, with many changed dates, fabulous support from patrons and volunteers we managed to make it through the two seasons but not without its problems. 100% expenses and less than 50% revenue.

2022 – Covid is still around and we are half way through our season, with plans underway for the 2022-2023 year.

1979-2022 Battlefords Community Players have continuously offered 4 shows a season with 6 to 8 performances for each show. In the last two years we have also presented 16 summer theatre performances and hosted many visiting individual and group performers to our stage.

At present we have 150 season tickets holders, 35 members and 25 volunteers.

INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Directors of Battlefords' Community Players

I have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Battlefords' Community Players that comprise the balance sheet as at June 30, 2021 and the statements of receipts, disbursements, retained earnings and cash flow for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on my review. I conduct my review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require me to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Conclusion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Battlefords' Community Players derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to me obtaining evidence I considered necessary for the purpose of the review. Accordingly, the evidence obtained of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of Battlefords' Community Players . Therefore, I was unable to determine whether any adjustments might have been found necessary with respect to donation receipts, excess of receipts over disbursements, and cash flows from operations for the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, current assets as at June 30, 2021 and 2020, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2021 and 2020 year ends.

Qualified Conclusion

Based on my review, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Conclusion paragraph, nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Battlefords' Community Players as at June 30, 2021, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Notes to Financial Statements

<u>June 30, 2021</u>

(unaudited)

The Battlefords' Community Players (Organization) provide and promote community interest in drama as a worthwhile form of entertainment and recreation. The Organization is a non-profit organization as defined in the *Income Tax Act* and, as such, is exempt from income tax. The Organization is a registered Charity.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and are in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. The Organization's significant accounting policies are as follows:

a) Revenue Recognition

The Organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. There is the General Fund, and the Capital Asset Fund.

Restricted contributions related to general operations are recognized as revenue of the unrestricted fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. All other restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate restricted fund.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the unrestricted fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonable estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Ticket and concession sales are recognized at the time of sale. Interest is recognized in the period it is earned.

b) Cash and cash equivalents

The Organization's policy is to disclose bank balances under cash, including bank overdrafts with balances that fluctuate frequently from being positive to overdrawn, bank lines of credit and term deposits with a maturity period of three months or less from the date of acquisition. Term deposits that the organization cannot use for current transactions because they are pledged as security are also excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

c) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided for on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Buildings	40 years
Lighting and standards	10 years
Miscellaneous equipment	5 years
Sound equipment	10 years
Stage curtains	10 years

d) Financial Instruments

Measurement

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Subsequently, equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are measured at fair value, and all other financial instruments are recorded at cost or amortized cost.

Transaction costs

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

Impairment

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Organization determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Organization expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

e) Contributed Services

Volunteers contribute a substantial number of hours each year to assist the Organization in carrying out its activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributions of such services are not recognized in the financial statements.

f) Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts in the financial statements and the related disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Reported balances which require some degree of estimation include accounts payable and accrued liabilities, useful life of capital assets and the allocation of expenses.

2. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Organization's financial instruments include cash and deposits, investments, receivables, interest receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The fair value of these instruments, other than investments, approximates carrying value due to their immediate or short-term nature.

The Organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments:

Credit Risk

The Organization is exposed to normal credit risk resulting from the possibility that a counterparty to a financial instrument defaults on their financial obligations; if there is a concentration of transactions carried out with the same counterparty; or of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics such that they could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions. There have been no changes in this risk from the prior year.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Organization will not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due. The Organization meets its liquidity requirements by preparing and monitoring cash flows from operations, anticipating investing and financing activities and holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There have been no changes in this risk from the prior year.

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The exposure of the Organization to interest rate risk arises from its interest bearing assets. There have been no changes in this risk from the prior year.

5. COVID-19 IMPACT

The COVID-19 global pandemic has disrupted economic activities and supply chains. Although the disruption from the virus is expected to be temporary, given the dynamic nature of these circumstances, the duration of business disruption and the related financial impact cannot be reasonably estimated at this time. The Company's ability to continue to service debt and meet obligations as they come due is dependent on the continued ability to obtain financing and maintain cash flows.

The Theatre's primary concern is the health and safety of its artists, patrons, and communities. It is in a constant state of monitoring the COVID-19 situation and updating or managing plans to mitigate the impact and to deliver its program, in keeping with its charitable purpose.

The government interventions have been of assistance to many organizations with help to maintain staff, however Battlefords Community Players is a not-for-profit charitable group, with a volunteer board, executive and management. Thus are not eligible for the assistance provided under these programs, so we rely on support of our local community to maintain operations.

It is not possible to reliably estimate the duration as well as the impact on the financial position and results of the Theatre for future periods, but management feels that the return to performances at the earliest opportunity are inherent and necessary to achieve its charitable purposes. The Theatre has and will prioritize the essential nature of live performance as serving basic human needs and act accordingly, for delivery of it's core program while maintaining it's ability to do so into the future.
